Introduction

Nestled in the heart of Murfreesboro, Tennessee, Cannonsburgh Village stands as a testament to the region's rich cultural heritage and historical narrative. Established as an open-air, living history museum, Cannonsburgh Village reflects the lifestyle of nineteenth- and early twentieth-century rural Murfreesboro, highlighting the significance of local craftsmanship, tradition, and community. The village was introduced in 1976 as part of Murfreesboro's celebration of the United States Bicentennial. It relocated several buildings to a former industrial site along Lytle Creek. The village consists of a collection of restored and replicated historical buildings, each steeped in history and curated to transport visitors to a time when life was defined by simplicity, hard work, and ingenuity.

The importance of preserving such historical sites cannot be overstated. Cannonsburgh serves as a vital educational resource, providing the public with opportunities to explore and engage with Murfreesboro's past in interactive and meaningful ways. It fosters a deeper understanding of the local community's heritage, ensuring that the stories, values, and lessons of those who came before are not forgotten. This commitment to cultural preservation is further supported by the extensive collections housed within Cannonsburgh Village, which include artifacts, photographs, documents, and other materials that illustrate the daily lives of the people who shaped Rutherford County.

In recognition of the importance of these mandates, Cannonsburgh Village, in conjunction with the MTSU Center for Historic Preservation and graduate students in the public history program, has undertaken a comprehensive Collections Assessment Report (CAR). This report is not merely a compendious evaluation; it is a thoroughly crafted examination aimed at identifying the current state of the village's collections, determining their historical significance, assessing preservation needs, and recommending strategies for future improvement before the upcoming Semiquincentennial of the United States in 2026. The assessment seeks to evaluate not only the physical condition of the artifacts, but also the narrative they convey and their role within the broader context of the community's history.

Over the past decades, Cannonsburgh Village has accumulated a wealth of artifacts that span various aspects of daily life, from agricultural tools and household items to textiles and transportation vehicles. Each piece is imbued with its history, representing the collective memory of a bygone community that has witnessed tremendous social, economic, and technological transformations. This report will delve into the intricacies of the collection, analyzing not only the provenance and condition of individual artifacts but also their overall contribution to the village's mission.

The goal is to provide a holistic view of the Cannonsburgh Village's collections, highlighting areas of strength and potential challenges. The following sections of this report will detail the thematic approach employed during the assessment process, the findings related to the collection's strengths and weaknesses, and actionable recommendations that will lay the groundwork for a museum collection that meets the standards of the twenty-first century. The ultimate objective is to ensure that the village is equipped to care for its artifacts effectively and enhance its programs in ways that resonate with current and future audiences.

Collections Management Policy Outline

I. Cannonsburgh Village Purpose

- According to the institution's website, Cannonsburgh Village "represents
 approximately 100 years of early Tennessee life from the 1830s to the 1930's".

II. Statement of Authority

III. Collections Governance

- Define who will oversee the collection. (i.e: Recreations Facility Coordinator, Assistant Facility Director, Board of Directors etc.)
- Commit to American Alliance of Museums professional standards (climate control, site maintenance, etc)
- Develop a collections management policy and collections management procedure documents
 - The collection management policy should establish the best practices and standards that identify responsibilities, a system to help staff make decisions, and ensure continuity. The policy should be approved by the institution's governing authority.

The collections management procedure should show the staff the details
of the collections management policy and how to implement it into action.
This should be developed at the staff level and is not required to be
approved by the site's governing authority.

IV. Acquisition Policy

 importance; primary object value (irreplaceable, define institution)
- Community Collection (Grade 2): Stable objects that can be used for non-museum environments; secondary objects value (difficult or expensive to replace, selected for specific purpose)
- Interpretive Collection (Grade 3): Objects used for current or future hands-on programs; tertiary object value (replacement possible but results in some loss of inherent value)
- Replica Collection (Grade 4): Recreations of historical objects (objects can be replaced)
- <u>Deaccession Collection (Grade 5):</u> Objects of poor quality; not relevant to the institution's mission
- 3. Develop Environmental Policy

- The environmental policy should include monitoring of relative humidity, light exposure and intensity, recording temperature, ultraviolet radiation, exposure duration, and regular building inspections
- Ensure collections storage remains within the recommended 59 to 77
 degree range and humidity range of 45% to 55%

4. Pest Management Plan

- Develop an Integrated Pest Management Program to improving building integrity to prevent pests, detect pest presence, and use of pests control services (nontoxic when possible)
- Limit food and drink consumption in Building and collection storage spaces by staff and visitors
- If food is permitted on site, spaces should be minimal and identified by proper signage
- Ensure proper waste bins are located across the site, outside of the museum, and storage buildings.

Thematic Explanation

A more concrete thematic approach to interpretation would greatly benefit Cannonsburgh Village because museum visitors will be able to better understand the story of nineteenth-century Murfreesboro. While there are plenty of thematic elements present on site with artifacts to support them, each theme should have a designated space within the site to better organize the thematic elements and the stories they tell. For example, transportation and commerce is a major theme that is corroborated by artifacts in the museum. The problem is that the artifacts are scattered throughout the front and side areas of the building, thus presenting a lack of organization regarding the themes of transportation and commerce. A recommended solution is to gather artifacts related to business and transportation into one area of the museum and incorporate a more comprehensive analysis of the business sector and transportation industry in nineteenth-century Murfreesboro. This strategy can apply to the other major themes found during the collections assessment.

The thematic interpretation of transportation and commerce is best represented in the main museum building through the horse-drawn buggy and the Polk Hotel artifacts currently located at the front of the museum. Objects relevant to the local industry thematic interpretation include the printing press, the foot-powered perforator, and the melting pot. These objects can be found in the south corner of the museum building. In addition to the local industry objects, many of the objects in the south corner highlight Murfreesboro as an agricultural community through the numerous displays of garden tools, planters, and plows. The theme of education is displayed through the student and school portraits of institutions such as Middle Tennessee State University, and Soule School, as well as institutions of primary education including Central High, and Christina Middle School. Objects related to military themes include the Stones River Civil War Battlefield diorama, the photograph of Stewart Air Force Base, the Last Murfreesboro DoughBoy exhibit, and the World War I soldier uniform. The objects that highlight the themes of military and education are located on the west side of the museum. The final notable theme associated with Cannonsburgh is domestic life. The objects used to represent domesticity include chairs, dining tables, individual portraits, beds, drawers, desks, and bookshelves. These objects can be found in the Dogtrot and Town Hall buildings located across the lawn from the museum.

While Cannonsburgh possesses numerous objects necessary to incorporate the thematic approach, there are issues related to current interpretation and layout that complicate this strategy. The primary barrier to the thematic approach lies in the fact that many objects lack substantial interpretation and labeling. Numerous items in the south area of the museum are not labeled at all and the interpretive panels for the Black Experience, and Reconstruction need to be rewritten to modern-day standards with a more descriptive narrative. Another issue is the current layout of the museum and the amount of objects needed for deaccession. Cannonsburgh has numerous repeat objects taking up space that could be utilized for other artifacts to present a well-rounded thematic interpretation and eliminate redundancy. The reimagined museum layout and the examples presented provide strong solutions to the lack of accessibility in the museum and the issue regarding space usage.

SPACE USE

This section explores the current spatial organization of the museum and some solutions of how to reimagine the space. This section will consider the layout and accessibility of the museum and other exhibit spaces at Cannonsburg.

I. Current Museum Layout

The museum's interior is primarily organized chronologically with some non-chronological exhibits included throughout. The space is divided using permanent wooden spatial partitions, wooden railing and fences, and exhibit cases. The figure below gives a rough sketch of the current floor plan and layout of the museum.



Sections of the museum, as it is currently organized, lack clear structure. The oblong shape and general asymmetrical design of the wooden partitions make it unclear where some exhibits begin, end, and fall chronologically. Additionally, the location of some exhibits—such as the Westbrooks artifacts and the hardware display area at the backend of the museum—make it unclear as to where the objects and interpretation fall on the museum's timeline. This all can make the sequence of the chronological path unclear for visitors.

The current partitions will make reimagining and future expansions of the space difficult. Because the partitions were specifically designed for a chronological approach and do not clearly differentiate each section, creating thematic sections will be challenging. Furthermore, the size, shape, and continuous construction of the partitions make rearranging them impractical and will highly limit future growth and reimagining of the space. In order to implement the recommended thematic approach, the current spatial partitions should be replaced, as will be explored below.

The exhibit layout should also be reconsidered in terms of accessibility. The placement of certain artifacts, partitions, exhibit cases, and railing create tight gaps that limit the accessibility of the space. Additionally, the railing and fencing used as a barrier between guests and oversized artifacts throughout the museum also limit visibility for visitors of shorter stature and those using wheelchairs and fail to efficiently keep out visitors from the artifacts.

II. Reimagined Museum Layout

In order to effectively implement the recommended thematic approach, the layout of the museum should be reimagined.

- 1) Partitions: The current partitions should be removed and replaced with new partitions. These partitions should be created or purchased with adaptability in mind. New partitions should be able to be easily installed and moved by site staff. This allows the staff to adjust the space as needed, whether it is incorporating new exhibits, expanding existing exhibits, or reimagining the space in the future. Likewise, if the collections are developed to fill the gaps in the chronological narrative, adaptable partitions will allow the museum staff to reintroduce a chronological organization of the space in the future.
 - For building new partitions, one approach is to construct plywood frames, and cover them with mdf, interior hardboard door panels, or similarly thin material panel frames. Consider adding caster wheels to further add to the partition's adaptability.
 - For purchasing new partitions, companies such as MBA and Pareti specialize in modular "temporary" walls for museums and exhibit spaces.
- 2) Rails: If barrier rails are implemented to block off oversized artifacts, they should be designed with accessibility in mind. They should be lower down to accommodate for shorter visitors or those using wheelchairs. Additionally, the rails could be placed at an angle and include interpretative panels. This removes the need for labels directly attached onto the artifacts, which are destructive to the artifacts and may be difficult for some visitors to read.
- 3) **Object Spacing:** To avoid creating inaccessible walkways, ensure that artifacts, partitions, exhibit cases, railing, and other obstructing objects adjacent to spaces that

visitors are intended to move through are at least 36 inches apart.1

4) Layouts:

The layout should be designed with a thematic approach in mind. Overall, the visitor entrance door should remain the same to take advantage of the accessibility ramp. The storage space in the front of the museum should be relocated to the back of the building and expanded to create a more robust collection storage space. This also frees up space in the front to be utilized for exhibits. A reimagined layout should include the following.

- Visitor Orientation Area:
 - Implement a visitor orientation section at the front end of the museum.
 - Include panels that provide visitors with the overall theme of the museums and each exhibit section.
 - If the recommendations made in the "Reimagined Town Hall" section are not implemented, the front orientation space could also house the "History of Cannonsburgh Village" exhibit.

Thematic Exhibit Sections:

- For a thematic approach, the order of exhibits is less important than positioning them to make the best use of the space. Themes with larger artifact pools or more oversized artifacts may need larger exhibit spaces.
- Below is a list of each theme, and gives a general look at which should be prioritized space-wise.
 - Agriculture:
 - Larger artifact pool, many oversized artifacts.
 - Most room needed.
 - Local Industry
 - Medium artifact pool, oversized objects.
 - More room needed.
 - Transportation and Commerce (Dixie Highway)
 - Medium artifact pool, oversized objects.
 - More room needed.
 - Domestic Life
 - Small artifacts pool
 - Less room needed
 - Education
 - Small artifact pool

- Little room needed
- Military
 - Small artifact pool
 - Little room needed

Collections Storage Area

- Dedicate the back area (furthest from the front entrance) to collections and exhibit materials storage.
- Add shelving, work spaces, and storage spaces for oversized artifacts and exhibit materials.
- Roughly 1/4th of the floorplan (the current amount of space used for the hardware display area) should provide plenty of space for a collections storage area.


III. Reimagined Museum Layout Examples

Below are four examples of reimagined layouts for the museum. All were created with a thematic approach in mind. These examples are not comprehensive, and are framework examples that can be further researched and developed to fit the needs of the collections and interpretation.


- A: Visitor Orientation Area





If a chronological approach is maintained, it is still recommended that the current partitions are replaced with new partitions. A chronological layout should be linear and generally be designed around a single loop throughout the building. This loop should begin and end at the visitor orientation area with clear signage indicating the intended route.

IV. Current Site Buildings

Currently, many of the buildings on the Cannonsburgh site serve as self-contained historic house museums, each containing objects meant to reflect the building's "original use" or designated purpose in the village. For many of these structures, the objects on display, interpretation, structure's name, and layout should be reimagined to provide a more historically accurate and accessible experience.

V. Reimagined Site Buildings

These are general recommendations for each historic structure.

- 1) Identify the historic significance of each building (What was the original use? By whom? What stories can be explored through this structure?)
- 2) Remove the artifacts marked for deaccessioning.
- 3) Identify artifacts that will most accurately reflect the structure's significance and fill in the gaps left by the deaccessioned artifacts.
- 4) Remove the gates blocking off the doors and decrease the amount of floorspace taken up by artifacts to allow visitors to move through the building itself.
- 5) Implement ADA-compliant ramps and design the space to allow for a more accessible space.

Beyond these general recommendations, below are specific reimaginings of the "Town Hall" and "University House" buildings.

VI. Current "Town Hall"

The structure's current representation as a "Town Hall" does not likely reflect the real historic use of the structure. Further research is needed to identify the original use of the structure and it should reinterpretted to reflect its original use. Furthermore, a majority of the objects in the Town Hall are either not historic or are better suited as artifacts in the museum. This leaves a structure without a clear identity and use until further research is conducted.

VII. Reimagined "Town Hall"

It is unrealistic to expect any of the recommendations provided by this report to be fully implemented by the United States Semiquincentennial on July 4th, 2026. Additionally, there are many artifacts in the museum that are not significant to broader local history, however, are artifacts that could be used to explore the development of the Bicentennial and Cannonsburgh history. With the approaching Semiquincentennial and the site connection to the Bicentennial, an exhibition exploring the "History of Cannonsburgh Village" could be developed for the Semiquincentennial and contained within the "Town Hall." This exhibit can explore a chronological history of the site's development. If further

research and a better use for the space is identified, this exhibit could be relocated to another structure of the visitor orientation section of the reimagined museum. Below is an outline of a "History of Cannonsburgh Village" exhibit.

• Exhibit Outline:

- 1) **Original Site:** Explore the site's original use and development, discussing the cotton warehouse, the railroad, and the Bottoms.
- 2) **The American Bicentennial:** Explore the initiative to create the Cannonsburgh site, the partnership between the city and the CHP, and the American Bicentennial Commission reward.
- 3) **Creation of Cannonsburg:** Explore the buildings, discussing where each one originated, how they were significant in their context, and how they were selected and moved to the village.
- 4) **Opening Modern Day:** Explore the opening of the site, notable events, and how the site has developed over the years. This could be capped off with showing plans for the site's future.

Once more research is conducted on the original use of the structure, rename the structure to reflect its historic use.

VIII. Current "University House"

While the interpretation of this Dogtrot house reflects its original historic use, the name "University House" may be the most accurate. While it originates from the site Middle Tennessee State University is today, the name does not reflect its actual use by mid-19th century agrarian families in Middle Tennessee. Unless direct connections are made to the university, the name should be reconsidered. Furthermore, many objects in the structure are either not historic or representative of mid-19th century agrarian families.

IX. Reimagined "University House"

First, rename the structure from University House to Dogtrot House and further explore the architectural significance of the building. It can be a springboard of exploring broader histoires of mid-19th century Middle Tennessee vernacular architecture. The furnishings could then more solidly reflect this identity, being specifically reflective of the time period and middle Tennessee agrarian families.

- b. Based on collections assessments, remove non-historic and non-representative artifacts. As explored in the collection management outline, further acquisitions for this space would focus on artifacts that can explore stories of mid-19th century Middle Tennessee agrarian families.
- c. Remove the gates blocking off the doors and decrease the amount of floorspace taken up by artifacts to allow visitors to move through the building itself.
- d. Implement ADA-compliant ramps and design the space to allow for a more accessible space.

The University House can serve as a model for how the other structures can be reinterpreted and reorganized.

Collections Assessment

John Wallace: Front Room, Storage Closet, Sled, Backroom (Southeast Corner and Center)

Desc: Wooden piano with metal pedals. The lid is nailed shut.

• Stories: No known historical ties, year unknown.

Historic Ties: Performing arts

o Accession/Deaccession: Deaccession. It has no clear significance.

 Damage / Preservation Needs: Remove nails keeping it shut, and minor chip damage on the lid.





• Princess Theater Seats

- Desc: A set of 4 connected wood and metal seats from the Princess Theater (local theater).
- Stories: Local Murfreesboro history, the public square, Dixie Highway developments, 1972
- Historic Ties: Transportation, Commerce
- Accession/Deaccession: Accession. It has historic significance and could tie into the narrative of the Dixie Highway.
- Damage / Preservation Needs: Chipped wood damage, dust, cracked wood damage, needs to be draped.

Desc: A wood-framed aerial photograph of Cannonsburgh from 1999.

Stories: Cannonsburgh history, centennial, not historic

Historic Ties: N/A

- Accession/Deaccession: Accession. It could be utilized for the "History of Cannonsburgh Village Exhibit" as explored above. Should not be a regular-circulated museum object.
- Damage / Preservation Needs: Frame in fine condition, replace plexiglass covering, frame needs to be removed for further assessment.



• Cannonsburgh Portrait

 Desc: A painted portrait of a fictionalized "Cannonsburg." Divided into three removable panels.

Stories: Cannonsburgh history, centennial, 1976.

Historic Ties: N/A

- Accession/Deaccession: Deaccession. It is a fictionalized piece without any significant ties to the site's history. It could be utilized for the "History of Cannonsburgh Village Exhibit" as explored above, but there are better artifacts to do this.
- Damage / Preservation Needs: Fine condition, new frame with a plexiglass covering (without being bolted down).



• Cedar Bucket Hand

 Desc: A sculpture of a hand made from the remnants of the "world's largest cedar bucket" that burned in 2005.

Stories: Cannonsburgh history, centennial.

Historic Ties: N/A

 Accession/Deaccession: Accession. It could be utilized for the "History of Cannonsburgh Village Exhibit" as explored above. Should not be a regular-circulated museum object.

Damage / Preservation Needs: N/A



Polk Hotel Artifacts

- Desc: A set of 3 (maybe 4, need to clarify) artifacts from the Polk Hotel: a painted wood banister, mantle, and podium. There is an additional, larger banister (??) that may also be a Polk Hotel artifact.
- Stories: Polk hotel, Dixie Highway, local businesses, 1929-1977.
- o **Historic Ties:** Transportation, Commercial
- Accession/Deaccession: Accession. Great pieces that align with the common transportation theme seen throughout the museum. Can also springboard a discussion of the development of Murfreesboro caused by the introduction of the Dixie Highway.
- Damage / Preservation Needs: Paint chipped.

• Revolutionary Portrait

- Desc: A wood-framed painted portrait of a book, quill, musket, U. S. flag, and cubbies.
- o **Stories:** No known significance, does not appear to be historic.
- o Historic Ties: Centennial?
- o Accession/Deaccession: Deaccession. No significance. No stories to be told.
- Damage / Preservation Needs: Paper back needs to be replaced. Wire needs to be replaced.



• Agricultural Tools (3)

- Desc: Three wood and metal agricultural tools, including 1 hand saw, 1 scythe, and a scythe handle.
- Stories: Potentially ways to represent regional agricultural history.
- Historic Ties: Agriculture
- Accession/Deaccession: Potential deaccession. These are all repeat/duplicate artifacts. Further research is needed to decide which, if any, can be used to tell meaningful stories.
- Damage / Preservation Needs: Rusted, potentially dry rotted handle. Reafix blade to handle.





New Royal Sewing Machine

- **Desc:** A pedal-powered New Royal sewing machine with removable cover.
- Stories: Late 19th century, Illinois. No evident significance.
- Historic Ties: Domestic arts





• WWI Soldier's Uniform

Mannequin's racial identity is ambiguous and positioned awkwardly. A wooden box/suitcase with items difficult to identify is positioned behind the mannequin and away from public view. Cursive, handwritten cards are used for labeling and interpretation, but are ineligible to a general audience.
- Stories: The WWI Soldier's Uniform could tell the stories of Murfreesboro's contribution to military conflicts in the First World War.
- Historic Ties: Military.

- Accession/Deaccession: Accession. With better and engaging interpretation, the items are valuable for telling visitors about Murfreesboro's men who fought in World War I, and the significance of the attire.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: Lacking cleanliness and maintenance. Service cap on the mannequin has spotted deterioration. The Containment case is not up to collections management. No micro-climate control in the containment case. No cleanliness. Lack of maintenance. Cloths—cap, ammo belt, gaiters—left on case ground. Items are at major risk of deterioration without intervention. Evidence of contamination and deterioration—immediate need for conservation practices.



• The Last Rutherford County Doughboy

- Description: A containment case containing memorabilia of the 323rd Infantry Regiment, 81st Division. Dogtags. A photograph of Pettis Graham Gordon who served in the Machine Gun Company, 323rd Infantry Regiment, 81st Division.
- Stories: The Last Rutherford County Doughboy could tell the stories of Murfreesboro's contribution to military conflicts in the First World War. Pettis Graham Gordon is the grandfather of ex-congressman Bart Gordon.
- Historic Ties: Military. The 81st "Wildcat" Division composed predominantly of Southern inductees, including Tennesseans, many from Murfreesboro and Rutherford County.
- Accession/Deaccession: Accession. With better and engaging interpretation, the items are valuable for telling visitors about Murfreesboro's contribution to World War I.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: The Containment case is not up to collections management. No micro-climate control in the containment case. No cleanliness.
 Lack of maintenance. Evidence of dead insects found within the case; at risk of future pest infestation. Two photographs with abrasive tape on their backs fell off and lay on the ground.



• Diorama

- Description: Large Stones River Civil War Battlefield diorama made by Tommy
 G. Craig, U.S. Army Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School Training
 Devices Branch, redstone arsenal, Alabama.
- Stories: Made in 1985 for the U.S. Army for military training purposes.
- **Historic Ties:** Military, Civil War, Battle of Stones River.
- Accession/Deaccession: Unless there are some significance or significant relationship with Murfreesboro and Tommy G. Graig, or miniature figures representing the Battle of Stones River, the diorama should be deaccessioned or put into storage.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: Lacking cleanliness. Plastic covering clouded by dust and debris.



VA Hospital

- Description: A monochrome aerial photograph of the Alvin C. York Veterans'
 Administration Medical Center, then-named the Murfreesboro VA Medical Center.
 Encased in a regular wooden frame.
- Stories: The Murfreesboro VA Medical Center, renamed the Alvin C. York Veterans Administration Medical Center, began in 1936 as a neuropsychiatric hospital on 602 acres north of Murfreesboro, Tennessee, authorized by then-President Franklin Roosevelt. In 1985, it was renamed the Alvin C. York VA Medical Center in honor of Sgt. Alvin C. York, Tennessee's World War I hero.
- Historic Ties: Military, healthcare. Alvin C. York Veterans' Administration Medical Center is located in Murfreesboro, Tennessee.
- Accession/Deaccession: Possible accession.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: Not properly encased. Should maintain a light intensity of 50 lux for all photographic material except modern black and white photos. Reduce the display time if it's impossible to keep light levels this low.

Cobble Vise

Shoe Last Stand

• Antique Shoe Stretcher

• Ferry & Co. Antique Washing Machine

Clothing wringers were commonly used in the past for wringing excess water out of clothes after washing. They were often attached to a basin or tub and operated by turning a crank to squeeze the water out of the clothes. Constructed of durable iron and wood.
- Stories: N/A
- Historic Ties: Local industry, clothing.
- Accession/Deaccession: Possible deaccession.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: The wringer shows signs of natural wear and tear such as scrapes, scuffs, and scratches. Label stapled onto the wooden frame. It may not be in working condition.



• Haag Brothers Washing Machine

Description: Haag Twin Wooden Washing Machine is an electric-powered washing machine designed for heavy service. The two tubs are constructed from durable white cedar and are mounted next to each other on a sturdy steel frame. The frame includes a folding extension rack designed for holding a clothes basket and a tub for rinsing or applying bluing. Each tub is equipped with a hose connection for draining. Additionally, each tub has an independent motor control, allowing them to be operated either separately or together. The covers are designed so that closing either one can automatically start the washing process in the corresponding tub. The wringer has independent controls, can be easily reversed, and can be adjusted to any desired position, where it can be securely locked in place. Donated by Bobbie Shelton Lonar.


• Washing Machine Early Wringer

Description: An early, wooden wringer washing machine. The most prominent feature is the ringer mechanism, consisting of two wooden rollers. A hand crank handle is attached to the wringer mechanism. The entire machine is supported by a wooden frame, which also provides a platform for the operator to stand on while using the machine. On it, a metal bucket with a Sunnyland washboard resting inside it.

Peanut Huller (thresher)

- Description: A Crack-er-Jack pea thresher, patented Oct. 10, 1899. It's missing a large gear on the back that drives the cylinder that tears up the hulls and a fan. A drawer or screen entering from the left end that slid in on an angle is anachronistic and clearly stands out as "artificial". A wood hopper that people would drop dried peas or beans into is attached on the top of the thresher.
- Stories: The peanut huller can be told as a story of agricultural equipment and machinery used by farmers in Murfreesboro.
- Historic Ties: Industrial parts, agriculture.
- Accession/Deaccession: Possible deaccession.





• Manual Thresher Machine (Seed Separator)

- Description: A vintage, wooden manual thresher machine. At the top, there is a large, rectangular hopper. The grain would then fall onto a sieve, which has a mesh that allows the smaller grain kernels to pass through while retaining larger debris like husks and stems. A hand crank that powers the fan, which creates a current of air that blows away the lighter chaff. Below the sieve, there is a collection tray where the cleaned grain would accumulate. The machine also has drawers, possibly for storing small tools or spare parts. The thresher is constructed primarily of wood, with some metal components likely used for the fan mechanism and possibly the sieve mesh.

Cider Press

- Stories: The cider press can be told as a story of traditional cuisine locally produced in an agriculture-based community. Cider was a common drink, especially during the fall harvest season. For some, cider making could be a small-scale commercial venture, providing additional income.
- Historic Ties: Industrial parts, agriculture.
- Accession/Deaccession: Possible deaccession.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: The cider press shows signs of natural wear and tear such as scrapes, scuffs, and scratches. Metal screws are rusted. Label is screwed into the wooden frame. It is not in working condition.



• Linotype Machine

- Description: A black hot metal typesetting machine that casts lines of metal type for printing. Featured a typewriter-like keyboard with a large array of keys. Each key corresponded to a character (letters, punctuation marks, numbers, and special symbols). The matrix tray (or matrix magazine) is a large vertical hopper that contains hundreds (or even thousands) of individual matrices. Each matrix is a small, metal mold that contains a reverse impression of a single character (letter, numeral, punctuation mark, etc.). The assembly channel is a narrow channel that runs horizontally across the machine. The casting head is the mechanism responsible for pouring molten metal into the matrix molds to create the type slug.
- Stories: The linotype machine can tell a story of printing, especially for the local press; however, every place in the United States has newspresses, and is not unique or has a significant relationship to Murfreesboro.
- Historic Ties: Printing.
- Accession/Deaccession: Deaccession. Murfreesboro or Rutherford County has no significant printing industry.





Horse Saddle

- Description: A horse saddle designed to be placed on the back of a horse, providing a comfortable and secure seat for the rider, while also facilitating the rider's control and communication with the horse. Saddle molded with words: "G.C. Baskin".
- Stories: N/A
- Historic Ties: Agriculture.
- o Accession/Deaccession: Possible deaccession.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: Dye fading from prolonged sunlight and aging. At risk of losing its moisture and drying out. Tears are visible.



Clock Hands

- Damage/Preservation Needs: The pole catcher shows signs of natural wear and oxidation. The noose specifically is in an advanced oxidation state.



Belt Lacer

- Description: A clipper lacer flat belt tool. The tool appears to be cast iron, with a dark, weathered patina. The central portion is a sturdy, cast iron frame that houses the mechanism. There are two long, horizontal levers with hand grips. These are likely used to adjust the tension and position of the belt. A vertical, wooden handle protrudes from the top of the frame. This is likely used to crank the mechanism and cut the belt. The exact details of the cutting mechanism are obscured, but it is likely hidden within the main body of the tool.

- Historic Ties: Industry, industrial parts.
- o Accession/Deaccession: Deaccessioned.
- Damage/Preservation Needs: The pipe threader shows signs of natural wear with extensive oxidation and rusting. Paint has completely faded.



Block and Tackle Pulley

- Description: A block and tackle pulley fixed on a block attached to an overhead hook. It is hung from the ceiling using a chain.
- Stories: N/A
- **Historic Ties:** Industry, industrial parts.
- Accession/Deaccession: Deaccessioned. There is no significant relationship or history of block and tackle pulleys in Murfreesboro.

 - Damage/Preservation Needs: Had mechanical components where visitors could press a button and listen to audio through double speakers. The button has been removed. Speakers likely do not work or electronic components have been removed.



• Tennessee College for Women Stone

- Description: A rectangular stone block with the inscription "TENNESSEE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN FOUNDED 1907". The stone block appears to be made of a light-colored material, possibly limestone or sandstone.



Push Wheel Cultivator Plow

- Description: A vintage, hand-powered cultivator plow. The main structure of the plow consists of a sturdy metal frame that forms a V-shape. Two metal handles, likely made of steel, are attached to the top of the frame. A large, spoked metal wheel is located at the front of the frame. Attached to the bottom of the frame are several metal tines or blades.
- Stories: The push wheel cultivator plow can tell a story of the cultivation techniques unique in Murfreesboro or Middle Tennessee's terrain. This type of cultivator plow was commonly used in the past for small-scale farming and gardening. Hillside Plow

Description: A vintage, horse-drawn hillside plow. It's painted a vibrant red, suggesting it was once a well-maintained tool. The plow is designed for use on sloping terrain, which is evident from its asymmetrical shape. The main structure of the plow consists of a sturdy metal frame, likely made of iron or steel. The frame is curved to follow the contour of a hillside, allowing for efficient plowing on slopes. Two wooden handles, likely made of hardwood, are attached to the top of the frame. This is the curved metal blade that cuts into the soil and turns it over. The moldboard on this plow is designed to push the soil uphill, preventing it from sliding back down the slope. Double Neck Ox Yoke

• Description: a vintage, wooden double neck ox yoke. It is painted a bright red, suggesting it was once a well-maintained tool. The yoke is designed to be attached to the necks of two oxen, allowing them to work together to pull heavy loads, such as wagons or plows. The main structure of the yoke is a curved piece of wood, likely oak or another sturdy hardwood. A smaller, curved piece of wood, typically called a bow, is attached to the center of the main frame. This bow helps

to distribute the weight of the load evenly between the two oxen. Two wooden pieces, often called neckpieces, are attached to the ends of the main frame. A metal pin is inserted through the bow and the main frame, allowing the yoke to be adjusted to fit different-sized oxen. A metal ring is attached to the bow. This ring is used to attach chains or ropes to the yoke, which are then used to connect the yoke to the load being pulled.



- ash removal. The oven is located above the firebox. The flat top plate would have been used for cooking directly over the heat source. The stove rests on four sturdy legs.

Damage/Preservation Needs: The presentation of these artifacts currently resides on a large yellow structure standing in the middle of the room. All the artifacts should be moved to the area along the wall behind where the yellow horse carriage is. The structure takes up space and blocks the view of the cotton exhibit. The three exhibits should be displaced side by side in their new area as it is the best way to utilize the space created by the relocation of the yellow carriage. The Old Murfreesboro interpretative panel needs to be completely redone as the letters are rather faded. Something to consider might be a digital interpretation.



The language used on the interpretive panels needs to be updated to 21st century social standards. The narrative appears to be playing the devil's advocate when discussing the conditions of slaves in Middle Tennessee as well as the enforcement of slave codes. The language should be more concise and historical. The dollhouse should be deaccessioned, as it is not well-incorporated into the exhibit due to absence of label and interpretation.

Wartime:

Accession/Deaccession-Materials donated need to be deaccessioned as they have no documented historical relevance to Murfreesboro or Middle Tennessee. Many of these items are related to the domestic culture theme and are therefore out of place in the wartime section. The interpretive panel needs to be improved as there are some punctuation errors and issues with the photograph adhesives.



Reconstruction:






